



## BRI'S ADIRONDACK CENTER FOR LOON CONSERVATION'S 2015 HIGHLIGHTS



- > Please join us in welcoming Martha Van der Voort and Rory Keating to our staff? We hope you enjoy getting to know Martha and Rory over the coming year, and, with your support, that their positions will evolve from one-year into long-term staff. - With our expanding program, the time has now come for us to "build our own nest." And so, we have set the ambitious goal for 2016 of revitalizing a long vacant storefront in the Tri-Lakes area to create a physical Adirondack Loon Center! The Center will house a dynamic environmental education area, office space for our growing staff (indeed, we've already outgrown the dining room table in the Schoch house!), and a retail shop highlighting loony items by local artisans. Working in our own "nest" will greatly facilitate our ability to conduct education and training programs, implement outreach strategies, and fortify our scientific research.





- This spring, we released our New York Loon Status Report, which summarizes the status of the NY loon population, botulism type-E and other threats affecting loons, and conservation actions taken to maintain their populations. This report is part of a series for BRI's Restore the Call national loon conservation project supported by the Ricketts Conservation Foundation. - Adirondack loon mercury research update: Once again, our dedicated field staff spent the summer observing loons on more than 90 Adirondack lakes and ponds to determine the reproductive success of more than 300 banded loons with potential to return to the Park. Thirteen loons were also captured and sampled on seven lakes as part of our NYSERDA-supported study to assess the impacts of mercury pollution to Adirondack aquatic ecosystems using the Common Loon as a sentinel species.





Loon nesting success study: In 2015, our field staff placed trail cameras at 15 Adirondack loon nest sites to learn about factors affecting loon nesting success. Since 2013, we have captured thousands of fascinating images, including loons turning eggs, switching incubation duties, and interacting with other wildlife; newly hatched chicks; and humans looking at nesting birds. We are honored to have received a prestigious National Film Preservation Foundation Grant to preserve and digitize historic Adirondack loon behavior and natural history films by naturalist Kip Taylor. We look forward to sharing Kip's unique underwater footage of swimming and feeding loons with you in the coming year!
