- The Adirondack Loon Center moved to 15 Broadway in Saranac Lake: This new location, owned by Main Street Saranac Lake Development LLC, provides us more space for our offices, gift shop, and our upcoming educational exhibits on loon natural history and their conservation. We look forward to having you visit next summer to see our new exhibits and learn more about loons!
- > Adirondack loon research update: Thanks to continued support from NYSERDA and our many donors, we continued our field research this summer using Common Loons as an indicator of the impacts of mercury pollution on Adirondack aquatic ecosystems. Our field staff monitored almost 100 Adirondack lakes looking for more than 350 banded loons to determine if they successfully raised chicks. Additionally, we sampled 15 loons on 7 lakes to learn more about their health and mercury exposure, including recapturing an old "friend" - the very first Adirondack loon we ever banded back in 1998! It was fantastic to sample her again, after all these years!



- **Loon Rescues:** Our loon rescues are one of the most rewarding aspects of our work – from freeing a loon entangled in fishing line to saving one who is iced in, it is so wonderful to know we are making a true difference in the lives of Adirondack loons. For example, this summer, we documented that one of the most tangled fishing line birds we rescued back in 2016 was now raising two chicks!
- Please welcome Barbara Brisson and Valerie Buxton to our staff! As our new Communications Director and Office Manager, Barbara is the "behind the scenes" guru who keeps us running smoothly.
