


ADIRONDACK CENTER for LOON CONSERVATION 2020 HIGHLIGHTS

- Adirondack Loon Research: Fortunately, covid restrictions eased enough by early June that we were able to continue our long-term studies on the Adirondack loon population. Luckily, monitoring loons in a solo canoe or kayak can be done in a socially-distant manner!
 - o Loon Mercury-Climate Change Study: As part of our long-term research on the Adirondack loon population, 17 field staff monitored 107 Adirondack lakes this summer looking for over 328 banded loons to determine if they successfully raised chicks. We also sampled 12 loons from 9 lakes to assess their health and mercury exposure. The results of our fieldwork on Adirondack loons provide insight about the impact of factors such as climate change, predation, and human disturbance on loon reproductive success.
 - o The Secret Lives of Nesting Loons: We placed trail cameras at 16 loon nests this summer and we are now cataloging the thousands of images our cameras caught. Stay tuned for a report about this study soon!
 - o NY Loon Census: The 2020 NY Loon Census was held on Saturday, July 18, from 8-9a.m. Hundreds of people participated and sent in their loon observations. We are currently analyzing the results, which will be posted on our website later this winter. Many Thanks to all our Census observers!



Loon Rescues: We received a multitude of reports from concerned citizens about loons in distress. Fortunately, the majority of birds were actually behaving normally – most of them were bathing, and the callers were unfamiliar with how much a loon splashes about when it's taking a bath! We successfully rescued six loons - including three juveniles who apparently were learning to fly, but landed on a road instead of water.

Berkeley graduate, is providing us with invaluable assistance with the preparation of grant proposals.
